Description of fiscal impact

HB 907 raises the nonresident bonus point application fee from \$20 to \$25; allows a nonresident landowner, who meets specific criteria, to purchase an additional bonus point for an elk or deer license; and repeals 87-2-714, MCA.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

Assumptions

Department of Fish, Wildlife, and Parks

1. HB 907 will increase the nonresident bonus point application fee from \$20 to \$25 for each species.
2. Based on a three-year average, the department receives 40,323 nonresident bonus point applications each year. Assuming the same number of applications, the department will receive \$1,008,067 annually, which is an increase of \$201,615 in revenue.
3. HB 907 allows a nonresident landowner who owns 640 or more contiguous acres, enrolled in the Block Management Program in the previous license year, and who has purchased a B-10 license in the current license year, to purchase an additional Deer Permit, Deer B, Elk Permit, or Elk B bonus point for a fee of \$25.
4. Currently, there are 26 nonresident landowners enrolled in Block Management who own 640 or more acres. Assuming all 26 landowners meet the above criteria and will purchase an additional bonus point for \$25, the department will receive additional revenue of \$650.
5. HB 907 repeals 87-2-714, MCA, which is landowner preference for a B-10 license. This will not have any impact on license revenue as it doesn't change the number of licenses issued, only the way they are distributed in the drawing.
6. The department estimates a cost of \$33,000 to update and test the online license sales, point of sales

systems, and drawing system. This includes an estimated 180 of development time and 45 hours of testing time.
