Description of fiscal impact

General Fund Balance

SB 349 grants the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) all regulatory authority over air quality, water quality, and emission permitting standards for existing fossil-fuel-fired electric generation units within the state. DEQ would fail to meet the requirements of the Federal Clean Air Act and Federal Water Quality Act, causing the state to lose primacy over its air quality program and water quality program and therefore lose associated funding.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

Assumptions

Department of Environmental Quality

- SB 349 causes DEQ to lose the approved air quality State Implementation Plan (SIP) program. Federal
 funding provided from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), will no longer be awarded. While the
 bill targets existing fossil-fuel fired electric generation within Montana, the application of the law's change
 without a corresponding federally approved program, causes Montana to no longer have a whole and
 complete SIP.
- SB 349 causes DEQ to lose its approved air quality SIP program. DEQ could continue to collect its State
 Special Revenue, but EPA would dually collect fees from Title V sites under Federal Law. DEQ would
 modify rules to address changes and a new fee structure.
- 3. SB 349 causes DEQ to lose its authority for implementing the Federal Clean Water Act.
- 4. SB 349 indicates that DEQ is still responsible for environmental regulation but risks the loss of both federal and state funding.

5. Without federal primacy and oversight, DEQ will lose federal and state special funding until new rules are established, DEQ will need general fund to maintain the Air Quality Bureau (34.00 FTE) and the majority of the Water Protection Bureau (20.00 FTE). The costs shown include salary and benefits.
